Dear Parents/Carers

I am pleased to inform you that we were successful with both of our CIF (Condition Improvement Fund) bids. These bids were made to the government in November and were announced nationally vesterday. We submitted a bid for the replacement of leaking flat roofs and one to improve the security of the site. We look forward to moving ahead with these improvements as soon as we can.

This year, for the first time, we did not print our school prospectus for secondary transfer evening. Instead, we put the money into developing and building a new website. I am pleased to say that, all being well, the switch over to the new website will take place on Tuesday 23rd April. There will be a short period of final adjustments, but the site will be available for you to view and use from the first day of the new term.



The final deadline for payments is Wednesday 24th April and we cannot accept any payments after this date as the order must be placed on 25th April if the book is to arrive before the students go on exam leave on Friday 17th May.




We then attended an IBM workshop. We designed our own AI, making it respond to positive and negative comments, using scratch.


French Exchange

WINNER YOUNG CHEF COMPETITION 2019






Year 9 Shoe Designs



Drama Workshop

Monday 1st April Drama hosted a Splendid Productions workshop! The professional theatre company delivered a specially designed workshop for both GCSE and A Level Drama and Theatre students to launch their Component 1 Devised examinations. Splendid Productions have a hugely practical approach to creating theatre and take inspiration from many practitioners styles to combine in a unique collaborative way of working. The GCSE created incredible work in their two-hour workshop. They will take these ideas into their examined groups when creating 15-minute productions for the exam board. Well done all!

A Level had a four-hour workshop which explored their set text, Berkoff's adaptation of Frank Kafka's Metamorphosis.

Students explored the in-yer-face style of Berkoff's theatre and applied it to central themes and issues in the text. The A Level group have said this week that they have found a new approach to devising, and feel confident to explore practically in the ensemble without sitting planning and note taking. They are brave to take risks and find material through improvisation techniques!

An occasional dip into the archives

From the archives of spring term 1919

Presdales School, previously Ware Grammar School for Girls, has a rich history. We are fortunate enough to still have a number of items in our archives which make for an interesting read. As part of an occasional dip into the archives, this has come

from the "Account Of Ware Grammar School" Spring term 1919 entry.

Just as today we have musical concerts and dance evenings to look forward to in celebration of the end of term, in 1919 similar events took place.

"On Monday, (during the last week of term) a senior dancing party took place during the last half of the afternoon. On the following day the choir gave a private concert to the rest of the school, Millbrook (the junior school) also singing part of the "Children's Song", and "Ye Banks and Braes of Bonnie Doon". Miss Last and Mr Govier played two duets typical of the Italian and Hungarian Nations."

"On Wednesday morning, recitations were said in the hall and in the afternoon, members of the Upper IV, IV, Remove and Millbrook dressed up and recited "Little Miss Muffet", "Jack Horner", "Little Bo Peep", "Simple Simon" and "Who Killed Cock Robin?" in LATIN. "On Thursday morning the gymnastic competition took place....the result was the Upper V gained the shield. In the afternoon the intermdeiate dancing classes had their party to which they invited their friends"

"The Children's Song" is still sung by the school choir at our annual speech day and the gymnastic shield on view in the cabinet between the Library and Room 30.






