

Once you have selected UK Universities, it will give you a range of information about university life in the UK.




What do you need to know about university in the UK? Here are some


	UK Universities
Need-to-know jargon	'UCAS points' or 'UCAS tariff' are points allocated to different post-16 qualifications. UK universities might use it when making offers to applicants, eg 'You have to get 120 points'. 'SW' means 'Sandwich year', when you spend time working in industry as part of your degree. 'FT' means 'Full time'. 'BA' means 'Bachelor of Arts', a degree in a humanities subject. These definitions should get you started - we give a fuller set of definitions in the 'Help' section for this search tool.
World class	In the QS world university rankings, four UK universities feature in the top 10, while a further 24 rank in the top 200. Generally the UK is considered second only to the US in terms of the number of top universities.
Earning potential	In the UK jobseekers without a degree earn up to £12,000 a year less than their graduate peers entering the job market, the equivalent of more than £500,000 over an average working life.
Sweet deal	British students studying at UK universities can get government loans to cover fees and living costs; the loans don't have to be paid back until after they are earning at least £25,000 a year, and even then the loans are paid back only gradually. EU students are (for the moment) entitled to the same treatment. Students from elsewhere in the world pay more to study at UK universities.
Apply for a course	Students apply directly for specific degree programmes, eg 'History at Birmingham University'. This is unusual compared to other university systems, where students often only decide what they will major in in their second or third year of study.
Hierarchy	In the UK some universities are widely perceived as more prestigious than others, and have higher entry requirements. Unifrog gives you all the data you need to assess how prestigious universities are perceived to be - but our advice is to take this into consideration along with other factors, such as how your chosen subject area is taught.
One application	You can apply to a maximum of 5 degree programmes per year, all via one form. Although it takes some effort to make your application as strong as possible, the process is straightforward compared to most other university systems.

Using the dropdown menu, choose the country that you normally live in.



Select the qualifications and highest grades that you are likely to have at the end of year 13.






You can either enter a broad subject area that you are interested in or, if you know the exact course you wish to study, you can enter that too.

Direct matches are kept separate and preselected at the top.

You can also select any similar subjects that you are interested in. This might include joint honours degrees.

You can pick up to ten courses at a time.



This is the Longlist. All the courses for your subjects are sorted into three categories based on your grades and the entry requirements for the course.

Pick as many as you like but try to have at least one in each column.





You can rank and filter courses to narrow and personalise your search criteria.

Use the filters to only show courses which suits your needs. For example you may wish to only see courses at Russell Group or Top Third universities.



You can then use the rank buttons to see where the different courses fall within different criteria.




The map at the top of the next screen shows you the location of the universities that are on your shortlist, as well as your location (blue marker).






