***Great Expectations* by Charles Dickens**

Please read *Great Expectations* (or as much as possible) over the summer - see below for information about editions.

Feel free to use a film version, plot summary or study guide to help you. We are well aware that you may not have read a novel of this length before, so do use resources to support you if necessary. The York Notes Advanced is a good study guide for A level and this page has some helpful notes:

When you begin the course I shall set a schedule for a re-reading of the novel (3-5 chapters a week) so that we can study it in detail.

Answer these questions in preparation for studying the text:

1. *Great Expectations* is a 19th Century novel. What are your impressions of life in England at that time for different groups of people? What seems different from today's society?
2. What are your impressions of Pip and the ways in which he develops as a character through the novel? Do you think Dickens wants us to like him or not?
3. Pip is the narrator and protagonist of the novel. Choose another character - how do you think the novel might be different if this character narrated the story?

Optional extras:

- Read the other set novel *The Great Gatsby* by F Scott Fitzgerald (see below)
- Research Charles Dickens' life and career.
- Read or watch film versions of other novels by Dickens.
- Read a variety of non-fiction texts - e.g. newspaper articles and features, travel writing, biographies, memoirs, blogs or reviews. Some newspaper websites like *The Guardian* and *The Independent* are free to access and have sections for opinion/comment pieces, reviews and travel etc.
