Task 1:- Contemporary Examples





Sociology is an up to date subject and you will be expected to keep up to date with current affairs and apply contemporary examples to topics taught throughout the course.

- Find TWO news stories which relate to ANY aspect of Sociology. You can use a newspaper article, BBC news website (education/family/crime and deviance sections are useful), blogs etc.
- Think about how your story relates to Sociology. Which topic does it relate to? What are the current patterns and trends? What are the reasons behind the problem/change/debate? Do they relate to class, age, gender, ethnicity, power, government policy or globalisation?
- Prepare either a summary PowerPoint slide or poster for each story. It must include
 the news story/date/source and some detailed description with the facts and
 figures, as well as how it might be useful for sociologists. Be prepared to report back
 to the class about these contemporary examples.



Task 2 –Watch at least TWO TED TALKS

TED is a nonprofit organisation devoted to spreading ideas, usually in the form of short, powerful **talks** (18 minutes or less). **TED** began in 1984 as a **conference** where Technology, Entertainment and Design converged, and today covers almost all topics — from science to business to global issues — in more than 100 languages.
