### Task 1:– Contemporary Examples



**Sociology is an up to date subject and you will be expected to keep up to date with current affairs and apply contemporary examples to topics taught throughout the course.**

- Find TWO news stories which relate to ANY aspect of Sociology. You can use a newspaper article, BBC news website (education/family/crime and deviance sections are useful), blogs etc.
- Think about how your story relates to Sociology. Which topic does it relate to? What are the current patterns and trends? What are the reasons behind the problem/change/debate? Do they relate to class, age, gender, ethnicity, power, government policy or globalisation?
- Prepare either a summary PowerPoint slide or poster for each story. It must include the news story/date/source and some detailed description with the facts and figures, as well as how it might be useful for sociologists. Be prepared to report back to the class about these contemporary examples.



### Task 2 –Watch at least TWO TED TALKS

**TED** is a nonprofit organisation devoted to spreading ideas, usually in the form of short, powerful **talks** (18 minutes or less). **TED** began in 1984 as a **conference** where Technology, Entertainment and Design converged, and today covers almost all topics — from science to business to global issues — in more than 100 languages.

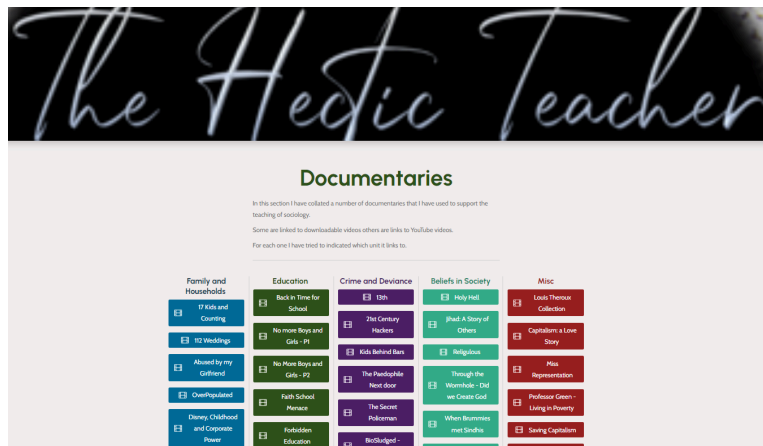

- Inequality (CAGES – Class. Age .Gender and Ethnicity)

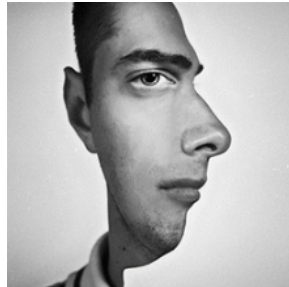
You should also be aware of how these documentaries link into specific areas of the specification.

- Mass Media

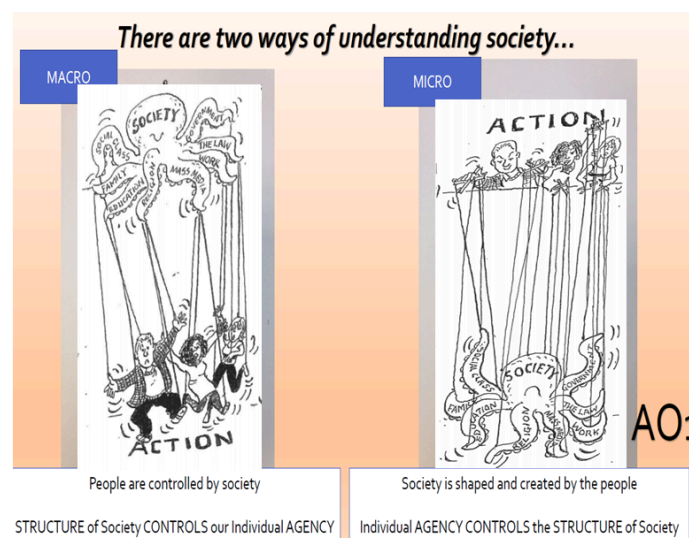
## Task 4 - Sociological Perspectives

A perspective is simply a way of looking at something.  
A sociological perspective is a way of looking at society.

Look at this photograph; not everything is as it seems!



There is usually another way of looking at things – and that is what we do as sociologists. We take normal, taken-for-granted life and turn it upside down, looking for meanings. and very often we end up seeing things very differently.



### Main Sociological Theories

**Macro (Structural)** – is concerned with the overall structure of society and the way social institutions e.g. .family, education, media and work act as a constraint, limit and control , individual behaviour. The individual is like a puppet whose strings are pulled by society . We might see people almost like jelly being poured into a social mould to set.

**Micro (Social Action Theories)** : Individual behaviour in everyday situations . These theories are concerned with discovering and thereby understanding the processes by which interactions between individuals and small groups take place, not on the social structure as a whole. They emphasise the free will and choice of individuals
